How to Reach Marist in Florence

Via Florence Airport

If you will be flying into Florence there will be many taxis available outside of the airport. Exit the main doors and go to the right to find the taxi stand. Simply ask them to take you to Via del Giglio 6. Taxis to the city center cost a flat rate of 20 euro plus 1 euro for each piece of luggage.

Via Florence Train

If you are arriving via train, you can reach the Marist Office on Via del Giglio 6 by taking the underpass inside the station which goes directly to the Piazza Unita, one block from the Marist Office. Take the tunnel exit on the left and go up the stairs. From the underground station entrance, proceed one block straight ahead and turn left onto Via del Giglio. The Marist Office is on your right.

Via Rome Airport

The Rome airport is located a few miles outside the city of Rome. Small connecting flights are available and fly every day between Rome and Florence and between Milan and Florence. It is also possible to take the train to Florence. In Rome, you must take a small connecting shuttle train between the Rome Airport and the Rome Termini station (main train station). From there, the Eurostar between Rome and Florence runs frequently and takes approximately 1 ½ hours.

Via Milan Airport

A bus is available between the airport and the Milan train station. The Eurostar between Milan and Florence takes approximately 2 hours.



THE MARIST BRANCH CAMPUS IN FLORENCE, ITALY IN PARTNERSHIP WITH THE LORENZO DE' MEDICI INSTITUTE

The Marist Branch Campus is located in the city center of Florence. Students reside in this urban campus among the many historical and architecturally significant buildings, shops, restaurants, and cafes that line the streets of this extraordinary city. The campus is comprised of 12 academic buildings, and more than a dozen apartments — all within a short walking distance to one another in the Florence city center.

- Via Faenza, 48**
This location houses some fashion design classrooms and work space for design faculty and students.
- Mercato Centrale**
Built in 1874, the central market is still the best source for fresh goods. This is one of the top places to visit in Florence, students shop here for fresh goods. It is a fantastic location to sit back and admire the culture. Outside shoppers will find a lively street market selling items such as leather and pottery.
- Via Faenza, 43/69R/71R**
This location houses many administrative offices along with classrooms, including liberal arts and Italian language courses. You will also find cooking facilities, a courtyard and a cafe for snacks.
- Via del Melarancio, 6/R**
Dance, restoration, and some painting classes are held here. Student services/facilities found in this building are: the student mailboxes, the fax facilities, and the packages pick-up. Additionally, students utilize the computer lab.
- Via del Giglio, 4 & 6**
One graphic design lab, a digital photography lab, including the digital photography lab. Space is available for computer connections and students may print documents and can pick up the printout at the front desk.
- Via dell'Alloro, 14/R**
The majority of studio art courses are here: painting, drawing, graphic design, printmaking, video production, and photography.
- Via dell'Alloro, 13**
School library is located here. Supplies and resources are available to assist students in their assignments. There is space for them to study and conduct research.
- Via dell'Alloro, 17/R**
Sculpture, Ceramics, and Mosaics are held in this building.

- San Lorenzo Church and Medici Chapel**
The Medici Chapel is noted for the frescoes of house artist Michelangelo. This chapel is considered the "official" church of the Medici. The Medici dominated Florentine politics for many years. It is a popular destination for art and history enthusiasts.
- Piazza San Lorenzo, 7**
Houses interior design with classrooms and labs including computer labs featuring industry software related to design courses.
- Freshman Residence**
One of the residences where students live, fully furnished, apartment, and dorm style living. This residence hall is in a prime location just steps from the Duomo.
- Ospedale (Hospital)**
Hospital located close to the city center. Friendly, English-speaking doctors are available to assist those in need.
- Duomo**
Florence's famous Gothic style cathedral is the city's most recognized landmark. This is the focal point of Florence; the Duomo's magnificent arch is admired by spectators from around the world.
- Baptistry**
One of Florence's oldest buildings, with parts dating to the 4th Century. This beautiful building dons the famous brass doors with each panel depicting a story.
- Freshman Residence**
A residence hall situated near one of the more famous streets in Florence, Via Ca'zavoli. This street is the shopping center of Florence.
- Museo del Bargello**
The city's old prison is now a rich collection of arts and sculpture from the Renaissance. This museum has gone through some transformations and is open to the public.

- Palazzo Vecchio**
This "Old Palace" is the political center of Florence. The Palazzo still fulfills its original role as Florence's town hall. Today it is famous for the sculptures displayed outside, including a copy of Michelangelo's David.
- Piazza della Signoria**
This is one of the most famous squares in Florence. It is like an outside museum with famous sculptures staged for public view. The piazza is frequented by locals and visitors alike.
- Uffizi Gallery**
Students from all over the globe come to Florence to visit this 45-room museum. It houses priceless works of art from some of the greatest artists in the world.
- Ponte Vecchio**
Designed in 1345, the city's oldest and most popular bridge. It was the only bridge not destroyed in World War II. The bridge is famously the Corridoio Vasariano which connects the Uffizi with the Palazzo Pitti on the opposite side of the Arno.
- Piazza della Repubblica**
This famous Piazza is very lively. Street performers, festivals, and other attractions rotate through this square. It is the perfect place for students to gather and observe the Florentine culture.
- Piazza Strozzi, 2**
(Palazzo di Palla Strozzi detto Lo Strozzi) Several Italian language classes and most liberal arts courses are held here. The Masieri's in Museum Studies holds most courses here as well. The Palazzo houses temporary art exhibits and introduces contemporary art to Florence. The building itself is considered one of the best examples of Renaissance domestic architecture.
